Founded by choreographer Jeremy McQueen in 2016, ballet collaborative and education vehicle which creates new, relevant classical and contemporary ballet works that celebrate diversity and Black history. Based in New York City, The BIP hosts a team of predominantly artists of color, and delivers cross-disciplinary and original works. Championing individuality, the collaborative harnesses the Black inherent creative spirit. The ballets that McQueen choreographs for BIP are rooted in Black history inadequately-represented stories begun to expand meaningfully outside its privileged past. His works push the boundaries of the ballet world as they highlight the personal narratives of significant Black public figures as well as extraordinary individuals amongst the general public who navigate a world that is prejudiced and dangerous for them. BIP has performed for audiences around the country and has been featured in numerous publications and Emmy® Award for their groundbreaking film, WILD: These walls can talk.

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Jeremy McQueen, The Black Iris Project, and the Balboa Theatre acknowledge that we are settlers on Kumeyaay land. Majority of central and eastern San Diego is Kumeyaay, while northern San Diego is Luiseño. We honor that Kumeyaay and First Nations' ways of being are not eradicated as colonial histories of genocide, commonly known as U.S. History, (mis)lead us to believe. This misconception informs (our) continued false notions of native erasure to

thinking this is our land. When it never was. This land, ocean, sky, and all living beings are inseparable from the Kumeyaay people. The Kumeyaay land was stolen and severed twice. Before the United States conquered this land, it was colonized by Spanish Conquistadors and became known as Mexico. The present day U.S./Mexico Border splits Kumeyaay land, forcing a political border and two (new) nations on their land. These histories are interwoven into every aspect of our city and the land we occupy. It established and normalized hate, hierarchy, pain, inequity, division, separation, migration and displacement through systems of enslavement, imprisonment, and genocide. We are all energetically impacted by these histories. Profound restorative healing is needed. The next time we order a "California Burrito" we might take a moment to acknowledge how we continue to benefit from histories of Spanish & U.S. colonization.

Founding Artistic Director & Choreographer, The Black Iris Project

Jeremy McQueen is an award- winning choreographer, dedicated to story-telling rooted in experience and social engagement. His work aims to create spaces of comfort, solace, and connection through reflection —a sharing of observations of what is going on around him. Born and raised in San Diego, California, McQueen is a graduate of The Ailey School/ Fordham University, B.F.A. in dance program and has also trained in the schools of American Ballet Theatre, San Francisco Ballet, and Alonzo King's LINES Ballet. A performer turned choreographer, McQueen made his professional debut at the age of 15 performing in regional theater productions in his hometown, and later went on to perform in the Broadway national tours of Wicked and The Color Purple, in addition to the Radio City Christmas Spectacular, and numerous Metropolitan Opera productions. As a decorated director & choreographer, McQueen is a New York Emmy® Award-winning artist, 2020 recipient of the Soros Justice Fellowship from Open Society Foundations, 2019 recipient of the Bronx Council on the Arts' BRIO (Bronx Recognizes It's Own) Award for Excellence in Choreography, 2013 recipient of the Joffrey Ballet of Chicago's Choreographers of Color Award [Winning Works], and a two-time finalist of the Capezio Award for Choreographic Excellence.

Often referred to as "The Black National Anthem," Lift Every Voice and Sing was a hymn written as a poem by NAACP leader James Weldon Johnson in 1900. His brother, John Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954), composed the music for the lyrics. At the turn of the 20th century, Johnson's lyrics eloquently captured the solemn yet hopeful appeal for the liberty of Black Americans. Set against the religious invocation of God and the promise of freedom, the song was later adopted by NAACP and prominently used as a rallying cry during the Civil Rights Movement of the 1950s and 1960s.

AN ESSAY BY LEA NEPOMLICENO



Callous. Cruel. Criminal.

You've likely encountered the three C's before. Whether its passersby "head-to-toe glances" of homelessness on their way to work or unforgiving Reddit threads "canceling" celebrities, the criminalization of everyday people is inextricably linked to the cultural implications of America's prison industrial complex. Far too often, surveillance, policing, and imprisonment are seen as solutions to economic, social, and political problems. And San Diego is no exception.

While incarceration impacts all of San Diego County, some communities are more affected than others. Imprisonment has the greatest impact on communities of color. In Barrio Logan, City Heights, and Southeast San Diego, incarceration rates are roughly double the state average. Our failure to cultivate meaningful conversations and action plans with the communities impacted most, is our failure to empower all San Diegans. We must be unafraid to ask the difficult questions: What polices marginalize formerly

incarcerated people? To what extent does race, culture, and money play a role? How can we dismantle this systemically unjust pipeline?

To this day, I don't know the full answer; but I know that conversation empowers social consciousness. When I was 13 years old, I spent my summer at the University of San Diego interviewing formerly incarcerated people. But that wasn't my original intention.

Before joining the Social Fabric Initiative — a program for youth to design and implement community change projects - I was completely ignorant about the struggles of formerly incarcerated people. This changed after a short, comprehensive conversation with a formerly incarcerated woman. By asking about her deep-rooted connection to Filipino culture and adventures exploring Downtown San Diego, I got to know her for who she was beyond what she did. While astonished by her story of unrelenting courage, I was taken aback by the fact that a system meant for rehabilitation took courage to overcome. United by shared concerns over the juvenile and criminal justice system, I and six other young people founded the community organization, Youth for Juvenile Justice Reform.

Undoubtedly, open conversation matters: the willingness of both parties to put aside titles, and instead see one another as human. A single conversation changed my world view, and ultimately the course of my life. Whether it's running a *Teen Vogue* featured podcast interviewing gun violence prevention activists across the nation or serving on the San Diego Unified School District Board of

Education and charing its Police Youth Advisory Committee, I initiate change one conversation at a time.

And you can, too.

The next time you head to work or school, kindly acknowledge the unsheltered individuals sharing the street with you. If you find yourself browsing the internet, don't add fuel to the already piping hot "cancel culture" train. Instead, share content that aligns with your values. Today, I'm 17 years old and hopeful. Perhaps the next time you encounter the three C's — Callous. Cruel. Criminal. — you'll reconsider using them to describe another human being.



Growing up, **Lea Nepomuceno** says her perspective on incarcerated people was skewed by the media. At 13, she cofounded Youth For Juvenile Justice Reform, an organization aimed at shattering stigma around formerly incarcerated youth. Today, Lea is 17 years old and was recently named one of Teen Vogue's 21 Under 21: The Revolutionary Youth You Need to Know. She resides in Mira Mesa.

Dear Attorney General Lynch:

You are my last hope; I pray you hear my cry.

My son Eric laid under my heartbeat for 9 months and I continued to nurture him until his last breath as an adult. For the past 2 years I have been searching for understanding as to why this tragedy found me and the answer has yet to become clear. Instead, I'm meeting Mother's whose tragedies are similar to my own. As the tears fall from my eyes, my body grows weak. But, I still the find the strength to put my arms around these mothers. The look of despair in their eyes mirrors my own and their tears become my tears. Attorney General Lynch, they

look to me for hope, just as I am to you.

Visualize my cry for help after I read my son's autopsy report. It said that the cause of his death was a "homicide"— this means a *deliberate* and unlawful killing of a person by another."
